3 OBJECTIVES




Provide opportunities for Catholic sisters to obtain secondary and postsecondary education degrees.

Increase sisters' competencies in their fields, toward greater effectiveness in accomplishing their ministries.



Ensure sisters qualify to continue their education after obtaining their secondary school or college diploma/certificate.

A total of 315 scholarships have been awarded to 185 new and 130 returning recipients since the last reporting period.







Zimbabwe

Expansion of the Scholarship Program to Zimbabwe marks the first ASEC program to be offered in the country. 10 sisters have been awarded scholarships thus far.



Expanded Degree Offerings

Outside of the secondary/form level, new scholarship recipients (2024) are studying in 57 distinct degree/ certificate/ diploma programs. A total of 8 general fields of study.

is the current overall retention rate of scholarship recipients (N = 1,069).


Use of Education in Ministry 98%

of sisters (*N* = 63) report qualifying to continue their education after completion of the Scholarship Program.

Over the last 13 years, as of January 31, 2025, a total of 1,069 scholarships have been awarded.



ASEC Scholarship Program

2024 Evaluation Report- Executive Summary



Data collected in 2024 indicates that the ASEC Scholarship program has met all program objectives. Although some long-term program outcomes require continued monitoring, there is evidence that these will continue to be realized in the coming years. Further, evaluation results demonstrate that the Scholarship Program is a vibrant, rapidly-expanding, initiative that is clearly aligned with ASEC's mission.

Since initiation of the program in 2012 (as of January 31, 2025), the ASEC Scholarship Program has grown to serve 1,030 unique sisters and women from 142 distinct congregations. Sisters and women served by the program have enrolled at a total of 228 educational institutions (schools, institutes, colleges, and universities) across the eight countries served by the program.

For the 2024 reporting period, the program has awarded **315** scholarships. Of these awards, 185 were provided to newly-enrolled students (including 5 lay women) and 130 were distributed to returning students (including 4 lay women). One-hundred and twenty-seven (127) awards were distributed to students studying at the secondary level, while 188 were distributed at the postsecondary level.

In 2024, a total of 63 scholarship recipients completed the Scholarship End of Experience Survey. In this survey, nearly all respondents (98%, N=63) strongly or somewhat agreed that they will be able to utilize the knowledge and skills they acquired from their educational program to benefit their ministry. In addition, 42% (n=724) of all scholarship graduates have been able to continue their education through an ASEC-sponsored program.

ASEC Scholarship Program 2024 successes include: continued high enrollment rates, expansion to Zimbabwe, and scholarship alumnae attendance at the 2025 ASEC Alumnae Workshops. Challenges encountered in 2024 included difficulty holding inperson Scholarship Orientations and orienting new staff to Scholarship Program requirements.


